Thoughts On Aging

The news for many months has been full of protracted budget stalemates at both the national and state levels. We face challenging issues and need to bring our best thinking and our compassionate hearts. In faithfulness to the biblical imperative to hold societies and rulers responsible for how they treat the poor, a group of concerned pastors has composed the following letter to the US Congress. The hope is that 1000 pastors will sign and then the letter will be published in a Washington, D.C. newspaper. In all likelihood by the time you read this that will have happened. The two of us have signed the letter. We do so as individuals, not as official representatives of Oak Grove Church. We urge you to make your voice heard as well in every venue possible.

Open Letter from 1,000 Pastors

We are local pastors. Our lives are committed to our churches and communities. Every day we work to preach and live the Gospel of Christ. We challenge our congregations and parishes to live lives of personal responsibility and encourage them to live good and righteous lives. This also means calling our communities and nation to live up to corporate responsibilities.

In every one of our congregations we have programs that help those in need with jobs, clothing, food, or counseling. We gladly take up the challenge of encouraging our congregation members to give more, but in these past few years, it has been difficult for us to watch the need around us rise while the resources we have diminish. We work, pray, and do whatever we can to remain faithful to the responsibility of every Christian to

help the poor. Still, we can't meet the crushing needs by ourselves. We do our best to feed the hungry, but charitable nutrition programs only make up 6% of total feeding programs in the country while the government makes up 94%.

In every one of our congregations we have members who receive much-needed support from government programs. We have seen this support allow young people to be the first members of their families to get college degrees, ensure mothers can feed their children a healthy diet, enable those with disabilities to live fulfilling lives, give much-needed medical care to those who can't afford it, support seniors, provide housing for families, and help people in finding a job.

SNAP, WIC, Medicare, Medicaid, Social Security, Head Start, Pell Grants, and Community Development Block Grants aren't just abstract concepts to us; they serve the same people we serve. There are changes that can be made or efficiencies that can be found, but every day we see what government can do. There is more need today than Churches can meet by themselves. This is why we join in the "Circle of Protection."

As Christians, we believe the moral measure of the debate is how the most poor and vulnerable people fare. We look at every budget proposal from the bottom up--how it treats those Jesus called "the least of these" (Matthew 25:45). They do not have powerful lobbies, but they have the most compelling claim on our consciences and common resources. The Christian community has an obligation to help them be heard, to join with others to insist that programs that serve the most vulnerable in our nation and around the world are protected. We know from our experience of serving hungry and homeless people that these programs meet basic human needs and protect the lives and dignity of the most vulnerable. We believe that God is calling us to pray, fast, give alms, and to speak out for justice.

As Christian leaders, we are committed to fiscal responsibility and shared sacrifice. We want to support you in reducing the deficit. Small business and job growth are an essential part of the path to prosperity for all Americans. We are also committed to resist budget cuts that threaten the well-being and, in some cases, the lives of the neediest among us. Therefore, we join with others to form a Circle of Protection around programs that meet the essential needs of hungry and poor people at home and abroad. We urge you to prioritize them, and we pledge our support and prayers for you in doing so.

September 18 is Heritage Sunday, in which we will honor those who have been members for 50 years or more and all of our members who are over 80 years of age (we recognize that there will be a lot of overlap).

OLIVE OIL UPDATE

You will soon notice a new look when you purchase olive oil from Oak Grove. Peter Mann, the founder of Import Peace is merging with another vendor called Zatoun. All proceeds from the sale of oil and za'atar will still be sent to Palestine. In order to continue to support our brothers and sister in need, Peter decided that a merger was in the best interests of Import Peace. Everything from the importation fees, cost of publicity, shipping costs and so on will decrease with this merger.



Along with that, the bottles that we sell will now be 16.8 ounces and will sell for \$14.00. Many of you will welcome that news since some were hesitant to buy the larger bottle. Za'atar will still be \$4.00/bag. The oil is fair trade, and certified as organic.

There will be a time in early September when you can taste the product. If you've never purchased before this will be a good time to try it.

As I write this article, I am eagerly anticipating the release of the final Harry Potter movie. I am jealous of those who have tickets and will dress up to go to the midnight showing. Our own family will have to wait several days, until we are mostly together, to go see the movie.

Our children grew up with Harry, Ron, Hermione and all the others. The first book we read aloud at bed time; all five of us gathering together to listen. As subsequent books were released and were available in audio we added listening to them on our summer road trips. (Our older two always insisted on finishing the newest book before we listened to it on tape.) At times we were so engrossed in the story that we kept driving in order to finish a chapter even though we had reached our destination.

So it was with a pang of sadness that we finished the final chapter of the final book. (And this movie truly marks the close of a really rich adventure on which Ms. Rowling has taken us.) I am grateful for this series of stories and say “hogwash” to those who see them as somehow evil. Like C. S. Lewis and *Narnia*, and J. R.R. Tolkien and *The Lord of the Rings*, the Harry Potter series has allowed another generation to wrestle with the battle between good and evil, right and wrong, and nuanced grey areas as well, and to have a rollicking good time doing so.

Part of what makes Harry, Ron, Hermione, and all the others so compelling is the way they enter into the struggle against evil and strive toward the good. And I for one am grateful for this delightful reminder about the importance of entering the struggle and making a difference for good.

Senior Driver Improvement Program Offered (4-Hour Refresher)

By utilizing the most up-to-date research in the field, participants will be provided the latest information about driver safety, new laws, and vehicle technology. Persons age 55 and older who complete the course qualify for a ten percent discount on their auto insurance premiums for three years, according to Minnesota law. First time participants must complete the initial eight hours of training and a four hour refresher class every three years to maintain the 10% discount.

I hope everyone had a nice vacation in June!! As you can see, we noticed you were gone! ☺ Monthly income was \$10.3K under budget, which resulted in a drop from \$6.6K in the black to \$13.5K in the red. We'd prefer black (5 Sundays in July will help!). New Covenant continues to do well, though. As of July 14th, we've gained \$37,785 for the year (3.52%), with \$765,956 in Endowment, \$275,971 in Session Designated, and \$68,562 in Long-Term Building Maintenance. Gains from these Funds, along with a portion of our Surplus (\$183,249), will help offset any loss for the year, as well as provide for Capital improvements. What a gift it is to have resources available like this! Thanks to all our current and past members for making Oak Grove what it is today!

Blessing of Animals

Saturday, August 27, 4:00 PM



You are invited to bring your pets (and your friends and their pets) to the lower parking lot. Please have animals on a leash. An explanation of this practice is offered below by Kevin E. Mackin, O.F.M.

As autumn arrives, people in various places may notice something odd.

A procession of animals, everything from dogs and cats to hamsters and even horses, is led to churches for a special ceremony called the Blessing of Pets. This custom is conducted in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi's love for all creatures...

For single householders, a pet can be a true companion. Many people arrive home from work to find a furry friend overjoyed at their return. Many a senior has a lap filled with a purring fellow creature. The bond between person and pet is like no other relationship, because the communication between fellow creatures is at its most basic. Eye-to-eye, a man and his dog, or a woman and her cat, are two creatures of love.

No wonder people enjoy the opportunity to take their animal companions to church for a special blessing. Church is the place where the bond of creation is celebrated. At Franciscan churches, a friar with brown robe and white cord often welcomes each animal with a special prayer. The Blessing of Pets usually goes like this:

“Blessed are you, Lord God, maker of all living creatures. You called forth fish in the sea, birds in the air and animals on the land. You inspired St. Francis to call all of them his brothers and sisters. We ask you to bless this pet. By the power of your love, enable it to live according to your plan. May we always praise you for all your beauty in creation. Blessed are you, Lord our God, in all your creatures! Amen.”

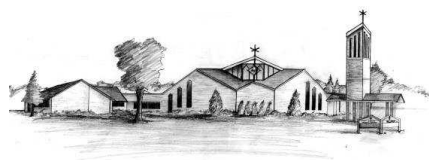

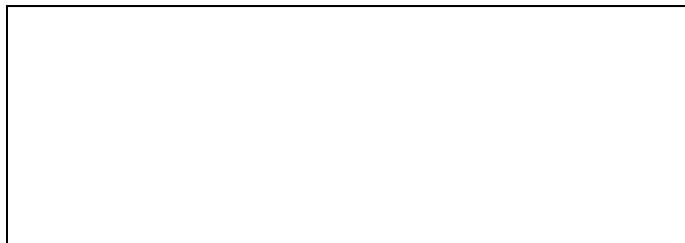

Rally Day — September 11 . . .

Takes on a New Design

It is hard to talk about or even plan for Rally Day 2011, but before you know it, the big day that calls all of God's family back together will be here.

With a few tweaks from what we have done in the past, the staff at Oak Grove have created a new format for how Rally Day will work this year.

The major change is that

**We will have only one service on Rally Day,
Sunday, September 11, at 9:30 am**

- The theme of the worship service for Rally Day will be community: what kind of community do we want to be? -- a community of love, forgiveness, unity not vengeance and fear.
- To celebrate the start up of the programs, banners will be made by different committees prior to Rally Day and selected members of the committees will carry them into worship. Each banner will represent the committee and its mission in the church. Banners will then be on display in the sanctuary during the service.
- After the worship service, we will have "God's Great Get-2-Gether" -- a potluck for all to enjoy in Gideon Pond Hall.
